
Fangirl: A Book Review

Just about the only thing that Cath enjoys about school is her writing class. After all, her Simon Snow fanfic, *Carry On, Simon*, is wildly popular, so it's clear she can write. However, it doesn't take Cath long to find out that fanfiction occupies a less-than-lofty position within the world of academia.

Fangirl provides interesting insight into the world of fanfiction, both in how it is received by the majority of people who are not part of the fanfiction world, and how those who participate in the writing and reading of fanfiction perceive it.
