However, when the kitten escapes, the space station starts experiencing a host of technical issues. Sanity and Tallulah need to track down their experiment before it's too late to save their home!

This humorous science-fiction adventure with a diverse cast and positive family relationships will leave younger teens delighted.

This heartwarming and funny graphic novel chronicles the coming-ofage of a modern witch while handling the topic of white-washed American history.

Mixing modern with magic, this heartwarming and inclusive graphic novel will draw readers into an adventure of magic and self-discovery.



Humorous, sweet, and a little creepy, this graphic novel is a joyous and magical read.



Drawing inspiration from Russian folktales, this novel tells a heartwarming but action-packed story about friendship, family, and finding home.



A hopeful and powerful novel that will leave readers hungry.



This fun road-trip read is all about relationships and pursuing your dreams.



