# Workshops with Partnerships Example: Puppet Building with Mermaid Theatre Company

A Program Plan

This section of the hotline is a guide for how to run theatre programming in partnership with various theatre companies in Nova Scotia! Each theatre company has special skills to share with the library and with your teen participants. Partnering with a different company for each event will help you cover all the bases and help you appeal to all sorts of different teen theatre interests.

This is a suggested outline for a recurring monthly program event, run on a day of your choice, likely after-school on a weekday or on a weekend day, for 3.5 to 4 hours.

The intention behind this example will be to introduce teens to prop building, but feel free to copy this structure to cover any event of your choice: scriptwriting, dance classes, or something else! Consult the teens at your library about what their interests may be and be sure to follow up your programming with a debrief (example questions listed below) and adjust your programming to meet their feedback.

This program aims to fulfill many developmental assets for teens, according to the search institutes 40 developmental assets for teens. These assets include but are not limited to empowerment, boundaries and expectations, constructive use of time, and social competencies. The following plan is designed to help teens develop interpersonal competencies through teamwork, positive peer influence and adult role models by working alongside our community partners. Through these programs, we hope that you will think about what youth can contribute to the community through their participation in theatre, offering teens empowerment in the process.

Depending on the program, one librarian and one instructor from the community partner of your choice will be necessary. This will require advocating for budget allocation. Given the resource intensiveness of some of these types of programs, especially prop building like puppet building, attempts to create with found or recycled materials will be not only good for the environment but helpful when advocating for these programs within your library.

Provide some examples of puppet building (t can be "cool"), from the company's previous workshops. Be sure not to force participants to share if they do not wish to. Brainstorm	30 Minutes	Teens will have 30 minutes to brainstorm all together or in small groups what kind of puppet they want to build. What will their puppet be like?	Creativity, teamwork, relationship building, leadership.	Chart-paper, markers.

## **Community Partnership Options in Nova Scotia**

**Prop Building:** Mermaid Theatre Co. This theatre company specializes in puppetry, and already runs several programs for children.
