Resources for Young Adults on Staging, Scriptwriting, and Acting

In this post, we have compiled a list of resources that young adults (or those who work with young adults, whether it be teachers, librarians, or directors) can use to look for information about staging, scriptwriting, and acting. Each resource is freely available online and paired with a brief description as to what the resource provides. Some are videos, others are lesson plans, and most include tips and tricks from those in the biz. We hope these will help your local production be fun AND top notch!

Collection of Various Resources

• Theatre Folk Free Resources is a collection of resources that includes monologues, multiple-person scenes, performance tips, and resources for acting, playwriting, directing, costuming, and the technical sides of putting on a great show. Intended mainly for theatre classrooms, this provides great resources for educators, but teens can also go through them independently to perfect their art. These resources come in the form of freely available PDFs that anyone can download and use.

Staging Resources

- <u>It's Not Just a Stage</u> from The Kennedy Center provides a quick and easy "anatomy" of the stage, including stage directions and the names of the different parts of a physical theatre.
- Working in the Theatre: Lighting Design is a video from American Theatre Wing. In this
 video featuring Tony Awards winning designers Natasha Katz and Howell Binkley, you'll
 learn more about what a Lighting Designer does, as well as more about the history, the
 equipment, and the artistry involved.
- This blog post from Theatrefolk compares two rehearsal blocking techniques: preblocking and in-rehearsal blocking. This post provides descriptions of these two styles, challenges to each, and things to consider when choosing which technique suits your production.
- <u>Blocking in Theatre: a Guide</u>, from Backstage magazine, gives some basics of blocking, including 6 helpful tips for blocking a scene effectively, from the perspective of an experienced theatre director.
- <u>Blocking 101</u> from Dramatics discusses how directors can use staging to best tell the story and convey the characters, including establishing character relationships, revealing character through movement, creating dynamic stage pictures, and more.
- <u>Blocking a Play: The Beginner's Guide</u>, from Prague Youth Theatre, is a useful set of tips to learn more about how to do staging effectively from the perspective of a director.

Scriptwriting Resources

- <u>This blog from Theatrefolk</u> discusses a wide range of topics related to playwriting and provides exercises to help hone your craft. Although geared towards teachers, teens can use this resource independently to practice their skills.
- <u>Script Writing Lessons</u>, from Burt's Drama, include a series of lessons in the form of PowerPoints, videos, detailed descriptions, and worksheets that go through the basics of plot structures, writing dialogue, writing for the space your play will take place in, and more.
- A Guide to Script Writing from Routledge is a comprehensive guide in the form of a blog
 post that will help teens build the fundamentals needed to turn their ideas into a script,
 including creating your characters, world-building, getting constructive feedback, and
 more.
- <u>Script Magazine</u> is an online magazine intended for scriptwriters and has articles describing what goes on behind the scenes, both in theatre and in film.

Acting Resources
